Indigenous artists

Andicha n'de Wendat (5 women performers from Wendake, Quebec)
 Opening Ceremony, 2023

To mark the inauguration, Wendake's all-woman drumming collective hold a smudging ceremony in the public square.

• Eruoma Awashish (Opitciwan community, Atikamekw Nation)

Interior work - Kakike Ickote (Eternal Fire), 2023

Sculptural and textile installations in resonant dialogue with the heritage of the historic vaulted cellars.

Exterior work - Kakiwimowok (They Whisper), 2023

Ravens gossip with each other, unbeknownst to passers-by.

• Ludovic Boney (Quebec City) - Family Gathering, 2019

Visitors pass through strangely familiar domestic interiors taking us back to the heart of warm memories.

- Christophe St-Onge Aubut and Nicolas Chalifour (Quebec City) Graffiti artists join forces to create a mural at the confluence of tagging and street art.
- Berceurs du temps (Montreal/Germany) Lulling Time, 2016

A meditative and immersive experience of the world of childhood on rocking chairs.

- Jasmin Bilodeau (Quebec City) The Era of the American Dream, 2023
 A blurred sculpture stands in contrast with the urban landscape.
- <u>Cooke-Sasseville</u> (Quebec City) *The Judgment*, 2023
 Never have we felt so singled out and judged by an artwork.
- <u>Patrick Forchild</u> (Quebec City) Dreamy creations imbued with nostalgia.
- Jarus (Toronto) Massive portraits in a classical style that connect with local communities.
- Cooke-Sasseville and MC Grou (Quebec City) Birds of a Feather, 2023

Three oversized birds seem disconcerted by a giant can.

• Pierre&Marie (Quebec City) - Big Other, 2023

Eyes watch us from the top of the buildings: benevolent or oppressive?

• <u>Camille Rajotte</u> (Quebec City) – *Merry-go-view*, 2023

A reconfigured city bench lets us spin around and contemplate the cityscape.

- <u>Cyrielle Tremblay</u> (Quebec City/Mexico) Dreamlike worlds where memory or poetry prevail, humor or absurdity.
- Pacha (Quebec City) Colorimetric space reconstruction.

International artists

- Felice Varini (France/Switzerland) Double Interlaced Concentric Circles, 2023
 A set of large-scale lines on the facades of multiple buildings afford a unique and impressive perspective. A Canadian first!
- AnonyMouse (Sweden) Little Quebec, 2023

In this imaginary world, mice lead urban lives parallel to our own. A Canadian premiere!

- <u>Bebar</u> (France) Falling somewhere between figuration and abstraction, with bold all-over composition and cartoon-like lines.
- Elisabetta Consonni (Italy) Zeno's Second Paradox, 2016

An astronaut makes their way through the streets in slow motion, as if weightless on a new planet.

Interior work - Dark Tide, 2023

A wave of broken glass flows through a showroom burying everything in its path.

Exterior work - Radical Nature, 2023

Somewhere between the Stone Age and our contemporary leisure society, anachronistic vehicles are scattered throughout the neighbourhood.

- Estefan (Belgium) Geometric constructions in solid colors.
- <u>Sam Laloux</u> (Belgium) Pop Art-inspired scenes derived from advertising imagery and popular culture.
- Leiga (Brazil) Abstract graffiti in brightly coloured, wavy shapes.
- <u>Luzinterruptus</u> (Spain) *Literature vs. Traffic*, 2012

Thousands of backlit open books spill out over the road. A Quebec premiere!

- <u>Medianeras</u> (Spain/Argentina) Alternating geometric solids and hyperrealistic trompe-l'oeil portraits.
- <u>Precy Numbi</u> (Democratic Republic of Congo/Belgium) Robot sapiens Kimbalambala, 2017

An eco-futurist hero dons an armoured suit made from e-waste and scrap metal.

- <u>Daniel Pešta</u> (Czech Republic) *Chain*, 2023
 A scene depicts fiery tension that builds to a crescendo (video created for the 2019 Venice Biennale).
- <u>Démosthène Stellas</u> (Belgium) Plant frescoes with Art Nouveau arabesques.
