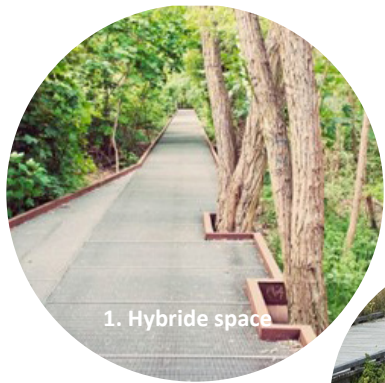

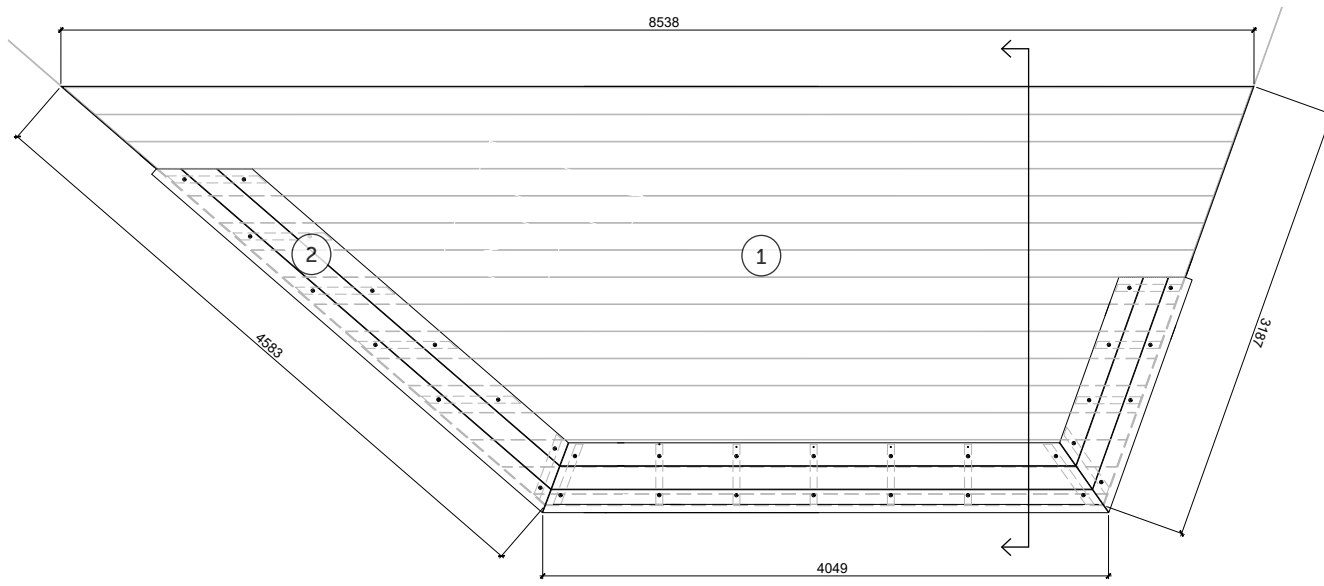

- ④ Work table with sink

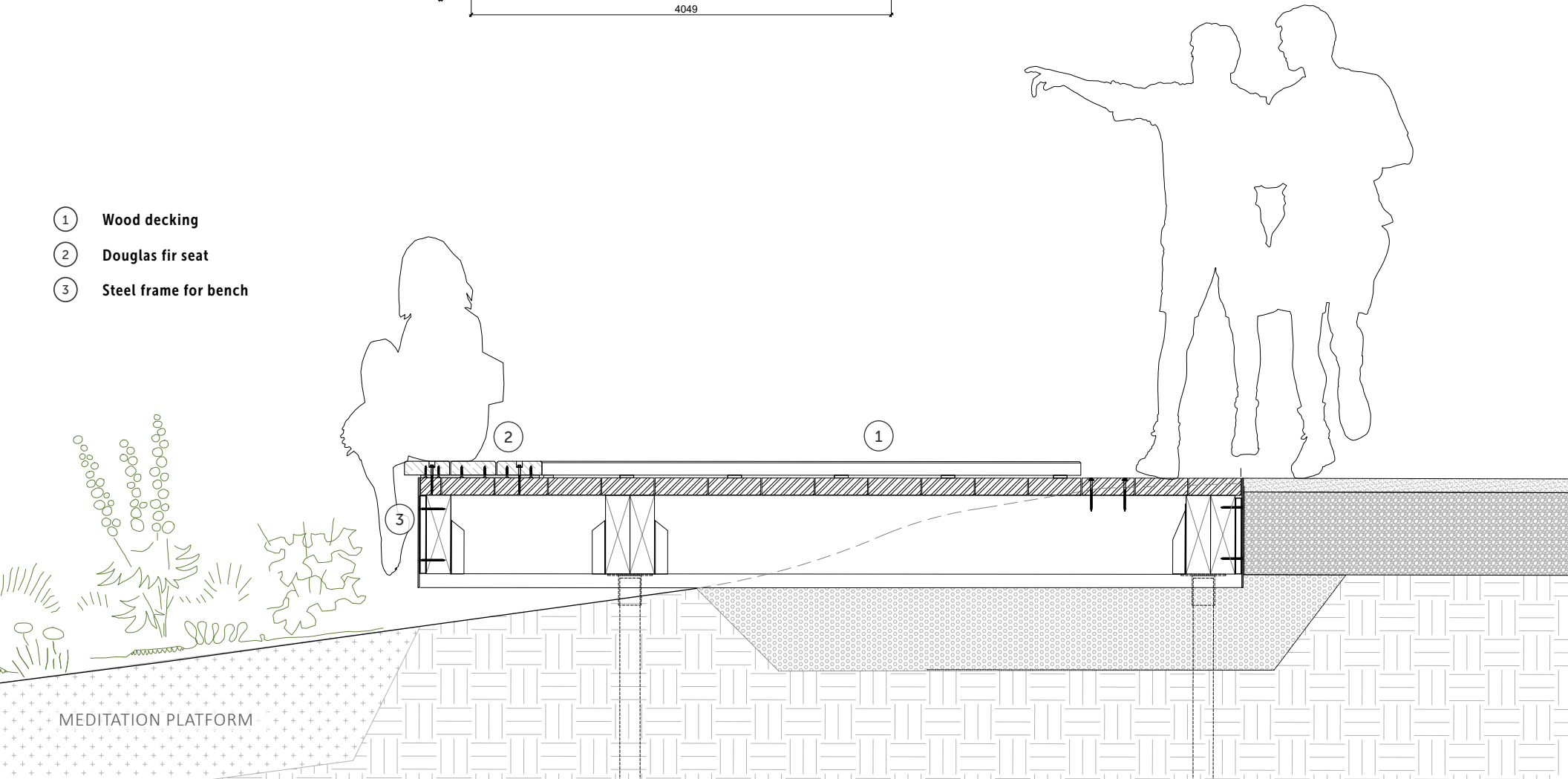


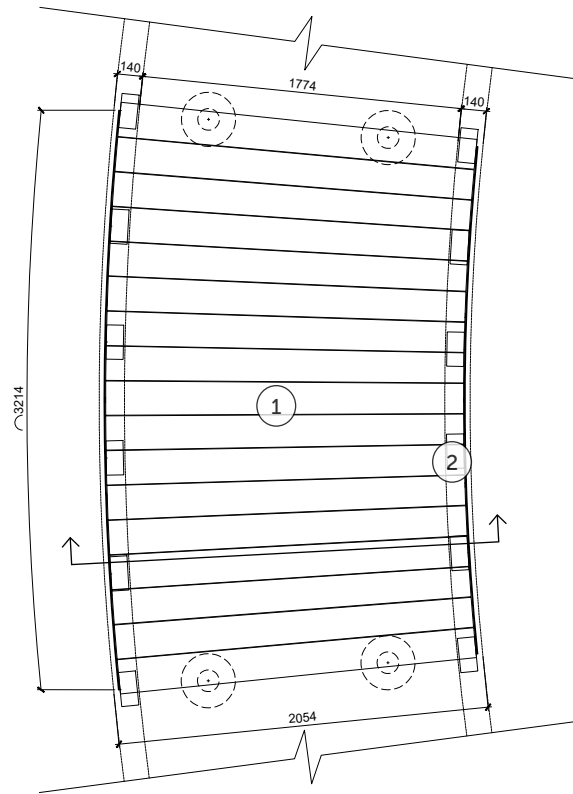
